The Deep East Texas region is located at the crossroads of Arkansas and Louisiana. It is flanked by the Northeast, East, and Southeast eco-regions of Texas and serves as the central gateway to the rural economic landscape of the enterprising State of Texas. Stephen F. Austin State University (SFASU) holds the distinction as the top ruralserving higher education institution in Texas (Alliance for Research on Regional Colleges), educating thousands of students each year and serving as an economic anchor not only for the city of Nacogdoches but also for the twelve-county region. SFASU is the dominant higher education hub, deeply rooted in the SFASU Way of unity, respect, caring, responsibility, and integrity, and has contributed to the economic well-being of the region.

Strengthen workforce development by partnering with educational institutions for CTE programs meeting market needs by creating educational pathways promoting continuous skill enhancement, and cultivating a versatile workforce driving growth across sectors.

Strategy 2

Develop and promote familyfriendly activities and venues by creating reactional spaces, the organization of community events, and establishment of centers that offer programs fostering family wellbeing and cohesion.

Strategy 3

Launch a revitalization initiative targeting underutilized commercial spaces and areas with high business potential. This initiative should aim to attract private investments coupled with incentives to create a businessfriendly ecosystem.

What's Next?

The role of the SFASU- Center for Applied Research and Rural Innovation is to be a catalyst for rural economic development. The FREDs have provided a springboard from which we can began to formulate plans to improve the economic development capacity of our region's counties. Our next steps will involve a second series of conversations with our counties. Slated to begin in early 2024 we will convene gatherings with our rural counties. Building on existing and new partnerships we wish to engage in discussions for moving forward with goals and objectives.

SFASU and the Economic Development Administration have made significant investments to support our region. Over the next 5 years funding in the amount \$ 6,000,000 designated for construction, programming and technical assistance.

Our next steps include:

- The renovations and opening of the physical location which will house the Center for Applied Research and Rural Innovation
- The designation of University Center by the Economic Development Administration focused on providing technical assistance, tools, resources, technology, and data analysis
- Funding to support staffing, consultation, convening of stakeholders and capacity building programs

Realized benefits will include:

- Site Selection and marketing tool kits
- Comprehensive virtual Economic Resiliency center
- Annual infrastructure needs analysis
- Workforce training for the jobs of the future
- A streamlined communication process and up to date, relevant information
- A regional resource guide to aide in business attraction, retention and expansion
- Formation of a Regional Economic Development Alliance serving Deep East Texas
- Staffing resources to carry out the work of our plan
- Access to University resources and research opportunities

As a resource hub, CARRI recognizes the need for innovation and use of technology to advance the region. Our aim is to coordinate, design, and leverage university programming to strengthen and enhance the capacity of the Deep East Texas economic development region to market and attract new business while working with our partners to educate, train and retain talent.
